MURRAY, KY. — The brothers of the Zeta Lambda chapter, Murray State University, Murray, Kentucky, were honored with the presence of two Worthy Grand Chiefs at their twentieth annual Founders Day celebration. A banquet and dance were held on March 31 at the Executive Inn in Owensboro, Kentucky.

Gerald E. Johnson, Worthy Grand Chief from 1958-62, and Dr. Patrick I. Brown, Alpha Tau Omega's present Worthy Grand Chief and an alumnus of the Zeta Lambda chapter, both spoke at the banquet that drew over 250 active brothers, alumni and guests.


The speaking engagement with Zeta Lambda was not the first for Johnson. He was the Worthy Grand Chief in 1959 and visited Murray's campus to install fifty men as charter members of the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity on May 9 of that year.

Johnson recalled telling the new chapter at the Installation Banquet twenty years ago that there would be "no hazing" and emphasizing scholarship. "In the past wenty years," Johnson said, "I feel they have followed my advice."

Before obtaining its charter the Zeta Lambda chapter served as an ATO colony for two years. (Initially formed from the Beta Tau Beta local fraternity). It was during this time that Johnson received a letter from Roy Stewart, ATO alumnus of Union, 1923, and the director of athletics at Murray State for many years.

Johnson said, in his speech, that Stewart wrote of the high quality of leadership and scholarship in the men of the Alpha Tau Omega colony. "I am proud of you for always having kept that record," Johnson said.

Johnson concluded his speech by saying Zeta Lambda is, "One of the best chapters in Alpha Tau Omega."

Brown was introduced to the highly enthusiastic crowd by Randy Hutchison, master of ceremonies, who said, "I'm damn proud to say — He's from Murray State!"

Brown graduated from Murray in 1965 and remarked, "I'm not really known for my modesty about this chapter."

Brown said fraternities served more of a purpose than "formal clicks" or for sentimental alumni. He quoted Otis Allen Glazebrook when he said ATO was "not man-made, but God given."

He urged the members of Zeta Lambda to carefully consider the future of the chapter. Brown listed three reasons why there would be fewer available undergraduate males entering college: the dropping national college enrollment, the "mean age" of our population increasing and the fact that a college degree is not as important as it used to be.

"We must be prepared for reality," Brown said, and constantly be aware of the image the fraternity is presenting.

"We want to insure a bright future for our chapter and our fraternity," he said. The active brothers should feel that they can, and should be better than those that have gone before them, he said. Brown asked the alumni to also be contributing members in the constant improvement of the chapter. And he added the word "contributing" means more than "bucks."

He suggested that the alumni could help the chapter plan for future housing, have rush parties in their hometowns and offer scholarships to defray the cost of pledge initiation.

After a tremendous standing ovation, Jeff Taylor, province chief, presented Brown with a plaque acknowledging Zeta Lambda's appreciation and Brown's national achievements in ATO.

Alumni and actives at the banquet not only heard two very inspiring speeches, but they viewed a film, entitled, "ATO Today." It was produced by Terry K. Dunn, former Worthy Master of the Zeta Lambda chapter.

The film showed the ATO house, located at 101 N. 16th Street, which was the first fraternity house at Murray State. Since the time it was purchased in 1967 many rooms have been added and the chapter's holdings have grown to a remodeled "game room" and additional sleeping quarters for the growing chapter known as the 'Annex."

little sisters brought the alumni up-todate with the present Zeta Lambda chapter.

Included in the film was the honored picture of the charter members, three of whom were at the banquet. Charter members J. D. Pique, Dwain Taylor and Bobby Cassidy all received a print of the fraternity house from David Graham, president of the Housing Corporation.

When these men were on campus, twenty years ago, things were a little different. At the time of ATO's installation there were only two other national fraternities on campus - Pi Kappa Alpha and Sigma Chi. There are now 12 national fraternities.

The enrollment of Murray State College was 2,400 when the "College News" reported Gerald E. Jones' visit to campus in 1959. Today there are 8,000 students enrolled in Murray State University.

Bob Jennings was the first president to serve the Zeta Lambda chapter. Worthy Master at the time of the twentieth anniversary is Lynn Richard, from Benton, Kentucky.

Richard said he tried to contact as many of the alumni as possible about Founders Day.

"We wanted the alumni to meet the chapter and see some of our accomplishments over the years," he said, "and also see where we are headed in the next five to six years."

Many changes have occured during the twenty years Zeta Lambda has been on Murray's campus, but ATO's still excell in leadership and scholar-

The Founders Day celebration proved as a significant milestone marking the more than 750 chapter members' twenty years of enduring brotherhood in Alpha Tau Omega.
